Deliver Cleaner and Safer Drinking Water

Greater compliance with federal drinking water standards¹

Enable Urgent Capital Investments in Infrastructure

America's 15 largest regulated, private water companies collectively invested **nearly \$6.8 billion in 2025 - and more than \$43.5 billion over the past decade - to improve infrastructure** and enhance the safety and reliability of water and wastewater in their communities.⁴ These are dollars coming from the private sector and not out of a municipal budget.



Are Strictly Regulated, Enhancing Transparency and Consumer Protection

- Public Utility Commissions in each state set water rates, **audit expenditures and approve investment plans**
- Regulators ensure safe water is delivered to customers at the **lowest possible cost**



Provide access to new technologies that lower costs and improve service

Technologies enable more effective, cost efficient, and environmentally responsible water treatment while providing metrics to ensure safe and resilient services.



Put workers first

Water company employees have a 41.5% lower illness and injury rate compared to municipal water system employees.⁶

When acquiring a system, water companies tap into existing workforce talent, protect union jobs, and offer access to job training and advancement opportunities.

Water company employees donate to important local causes, meet routinely with local officials and environmental groups, and live in the communities they serve.
